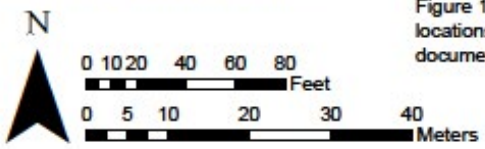
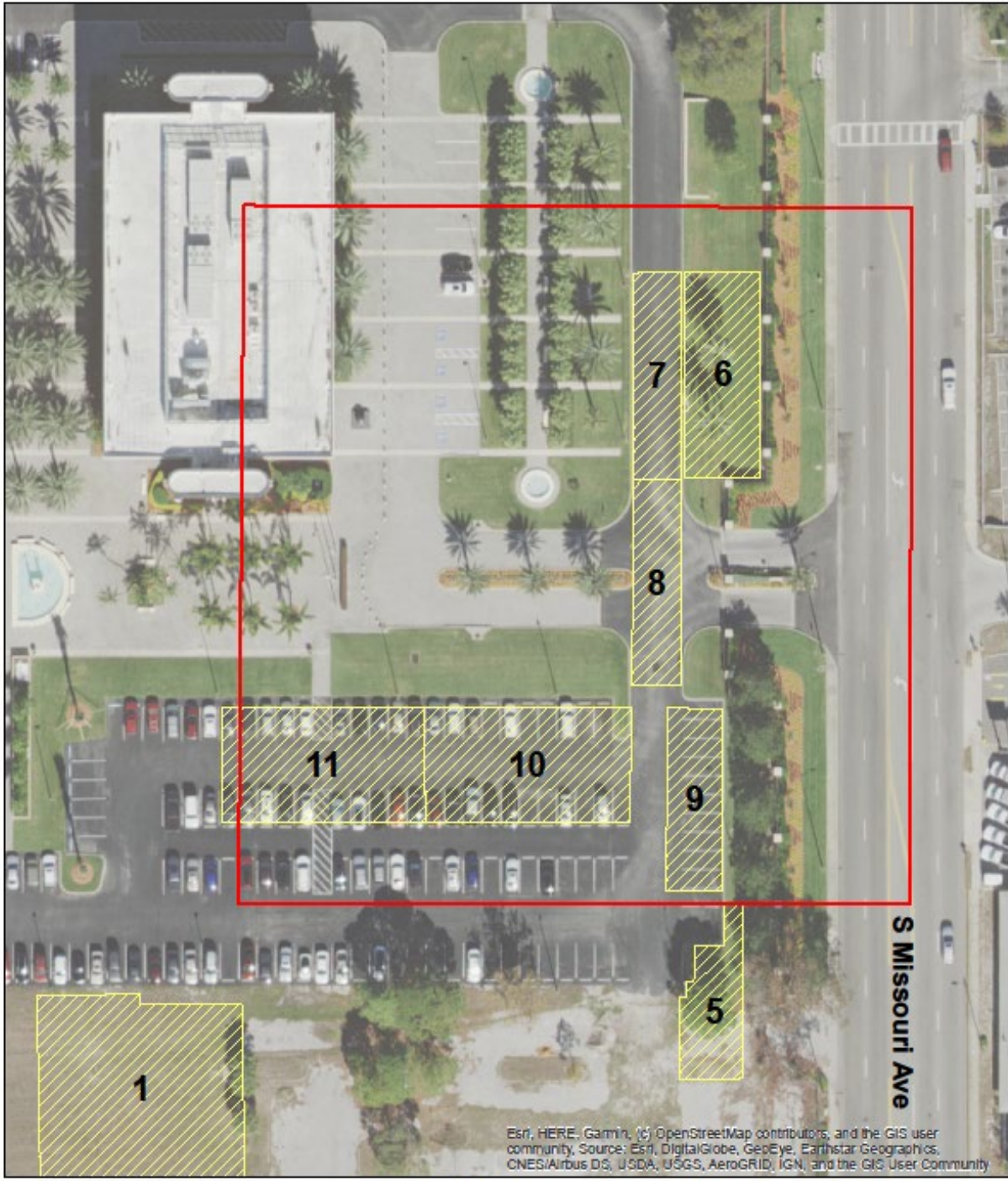


Figure 1: Additional GPR survey grid locations. Areas marked in yellow are survey locations, area marked in red is the potential cemetery location based on historic documents.

Introduction

An additional ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey and investigation was conducted in February/March 2020 by archaeologists with the Florida Public Archaeology Network (FPAN) at the Frank Crum Staff Leasing Campus located at 100 S. Missouri Ave in Clearwater, Florida.

In 2019, Clearwater-area residents and other local informants reported that a historic African American cemetery is located on the Frank Crum property. As reported, the cemetery was thought to be located in the southern portion of the property, currently an unused and open lot vacant of any buildings. Initial GPR investigation took place in January 2020 of this portion of the property (Grids 1-5) and did not reveal the presence of potential burials, albeit a lone suspicious anomaly (See attachment). During this initial survey, however, archaeologists received further information that revealed details of the cemetery's more probable location. This new information led to the additional survey. The results of which are presented in this preliminary report.

The additional survey areas (Grids 6-11) are shown in Figure 1. No gravestones or other visible grave markers are present within either of the surveyed areas. The additional survey areas consist of the main entrance to the Frank Crum campus, an access road to the north of main entrance, an adjacent grassy area along the eastern boundary of the campus (also north of the main entrance), and an asphalt-covered temporary parking lot (just south and west of the main entrance) . The purpose of the investigation was to use geophysical methods (GPR) to determine the potential for unmarked graves. Archaeologists performed the survey over two days, February 29-March 1, 2020.

Description of Geophysical Method

FPAN staff conducted a ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey of selected areas within the designated project area using a SIR-3000 GPR manufactured by GSSI, Inc. and outfitted with a 400-MHz antenna. Six grids were completed in total, with Grids 7-11 located on the paved road and staff parking areas. Grid 6 was located in the grass-covered area inside the property to the north of the main entrance. (See Figure 1 for Grid locations). The results of grids 6-11 are reported here.

GPR survey grids varied in size and shape but all data were collected in the same manner: uni-directional north-south transects spaced at .25 meters (approximately 10 inches) east-west along a baseline, with 512 samples per scan, and a time window of 50ns. Given the capabilities and limitations of the SIR 3000 unit, we designed the survey to optimize our ability to detect potential sub-surface historic cemetery features and burials. With Christian burials, graves are often laid out in an east-west orientation typically two to six feet beneath the surface. By using north-south survey transects we hoped to cross any potential burials at a perpendicular angle across their short axis, allowing for the clearest possible reflections. The relatively small transverse interval, .25 meters between each survey transect, was also necessary due to the potential for child or infant burials within the cemetery. Survey transect intervals should generally be designed to be smaller than the long axis of the potential objects being studied

The SIR 3000 data were post-processed by FPAN staff using GSSI's Radan 7 software package. Each transect was processed using the following steps, then brought together to create a "3D" or horizontal view of each survey area: 1) Time Zero Correction, 2) Full-Pass Background Removal, 3) Gain Adjustment,

4) FIR High-Low Bandpass Filter, and 5) Kirchhoff Migration to resolve hyperbolas into their point sources. Depth slice images were created for every 10 cm in increasing depth below the ground surface, intermediate slices were created as needed or when distinct anomalies were observed between the 10 cm intervals.

GPR Survey Results

Grids 1-5

Grids 1-4 located in the open, vacant lot area of the property. Grid 5 was located more to the east, just south of the staff parking area (See Preliminary Report in Attachment). Analysis of the processed GPR data for Grids 1-5 does not indicate an overall presence of grave-like anomalies in the areas surveyed. The soil within the area surveyed appears to be highly disturbed with multiple reflections picked up by the GPR (See Attachment). These reflections appear to be that of utility lines, such as large storm drainages, and their associated construction trenches, crossing through much of vacant lot. Other reflections are likely that of possible debris, the results of building demolition and site work. The debris is likely chunks of rubble or concrete some of which are visible on the surface throughout the surveyed area. Buried objects that are visible throughout much of the collected data also appear to resemble this type of debris and are generally the same size as to what is visible on the surface (between 1 to 3 feet in varying shapes). These objects do not fit a pattern expected in a cemetery setting. The utility lines are identified in blue. The buried debris is also labeled.

During analysis of the GPR data, archaeologists identified one anomaly that is of concern, located in Grid 1 (See Preliminary Report in Attachment). This buried object in particular is located at a depth common with historic burials, is vaguely rectangular in shape, and is larger than the other debris discussed above. This buried anomaly is approximately 5 to 6 feet along its long axis. However, there are no other similar anomalies nearby and its proximity to a buried utility makes it more likely that this reflection is related to the buried utilities or other more modern disturbances. Out of an abundance of caution however, we recommend that if any ground disturbances are planned in the future that this one area is investigated more fully.

Grids 6-11

Analysis of the processed GPR data indicates the presence of potential burials throughout each of the additional survey grids (Grids 6-11). The characteristics of the potential burials are consistent with the size, shape, depth, and patterning of coffin burials found within a historic cemetery. See Figure 1 for Additional Survey Grid locations. (Figure 1 is also found in the attached Preliminary Report for Additional Phase of GPR Survey, Frank Crum Property, Clearwater, FL submitted in March 2020).

The potential burials are characterized by a rectangular shape with long axis oriented in an east/west direction. These objects average 5 to 6 feet in length and are organized in rows or grouped in clusters. The depth of these potential burials vary within the additional survey grids due to modern modifications in surface grade from one area to another. The most shallow begin at less than 3 feet below current ground surface; whereas the more deeply buried begin at approximately between 4 to 5 feet below the ground surface.

In addition to the presence of potential burials archaeologists also identified several different types of buried objects throughout survey in Grids 6-11. These objects consist of buried pipes, utility lines, and

associated construction trenches. In the attached preliminary reports, stormwater drains are referenced in light blue and have been cross-referenced with City of Clearwater engineering department maps.

All of the potential burials are located within the expected boundaries of the cemetery. More investigation is necessary, however, to determine the full extent of potential burials and boundaries of the cemetery. Additional survey Grids 6-11 sampled only a portion of the suspected area in order to determine presence or absence of potential burials.

Grid 6

Grid 6 was located in a grassy area in the northeast portion of the potential cemetery area between a metal fence and a paved driveway. Several large palm trees were located within the Grid. Figure 2 shows the results for the Grid 6 area. Starting around 80cmbs rectangular grave-like anomalies begin to appear in several sections of the survey area. They are most defined between 100-110 cmbs and disappear below 130 cmbs.

Grid 7

Grid 7 was located just west of Grid 6, in the paved north/south oriented driveway from the main entrance road (Figure 3). Grave-like anomalies begin to appear within Grid 7 at around 60 cmbs and are most visible between 70-80 cmbs. These anomalies are rectangular in shape and consistent with those observed in other historic cemeteries.

Grid 8

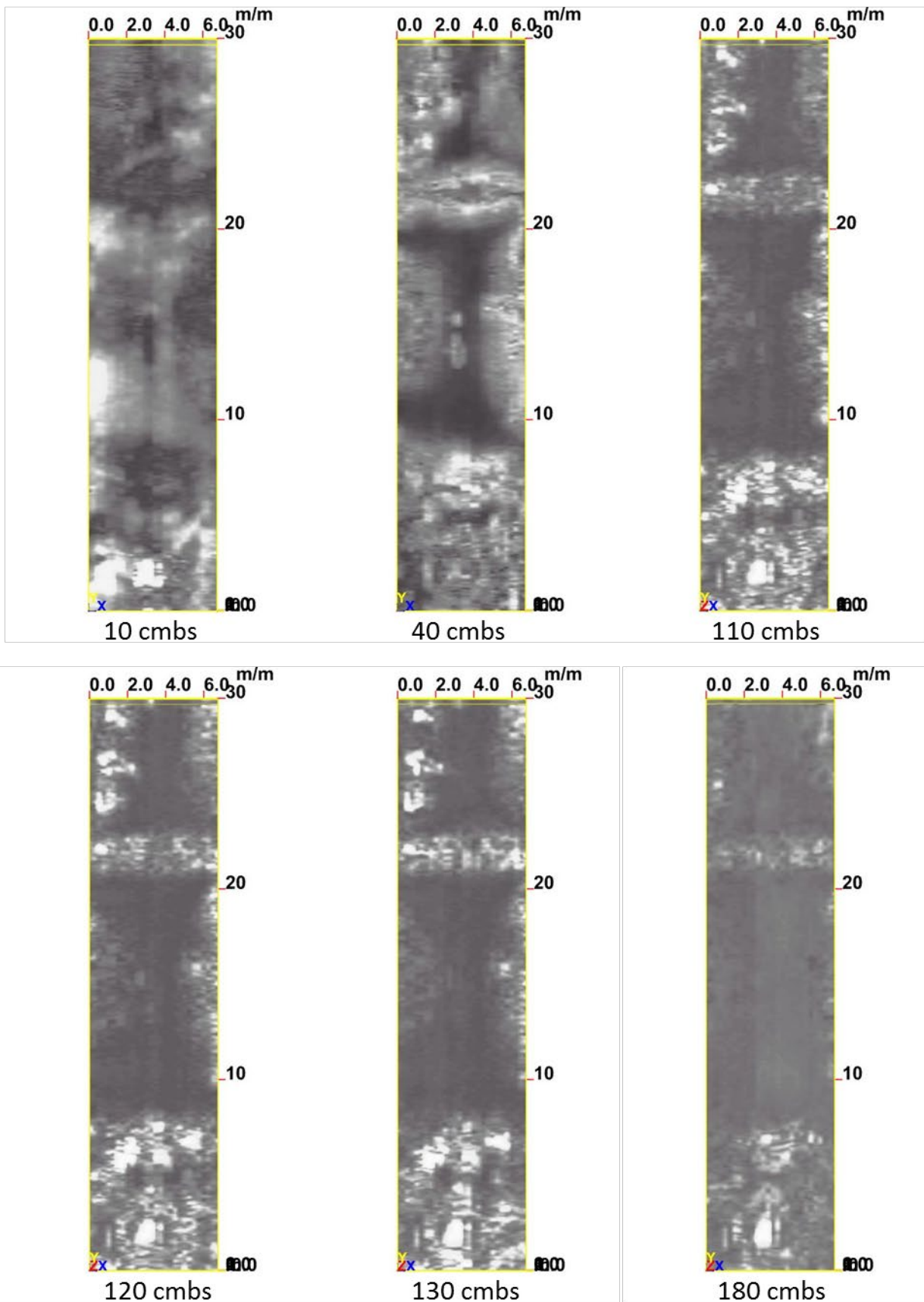
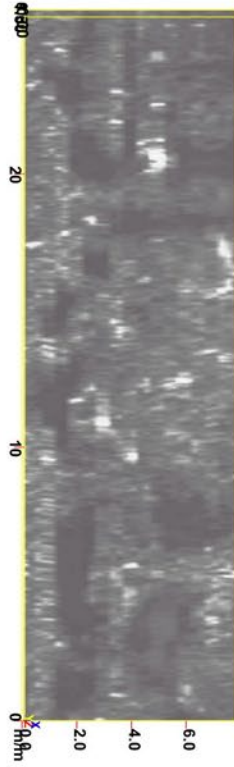


Figure 4 – Grid 8 results

Grid 8 was located just south of Grid 7, in the paved driveway and across the main entrance road to the Crum property. Several buried storm drains or other utilities were visible within the Grid 8 area, along with at least 3 grave-like anomalies in the northwest corner of the Grid. See Figure 4 for an overview of the depth slices in this area.

Grid 9

Grid 9 was located in the extreme southeast corner of the paved parking lot on the southern portion of the Crum property. GPR results reveal a large storm drain or other buried utility going north/south along the western boundary of Grid 9 (Figure 5). The eastern 2/3 of Grid 9 show evidence of multiple grave-like anomalies between 70-110 cmbs. Some of these go right up to the trench for the more modern utility, indicating the possible graves might have been disturbed by this past ground disturbance. Any future ground truthing done in this area should be able to confirm if graves were previously disturbed in this manner.

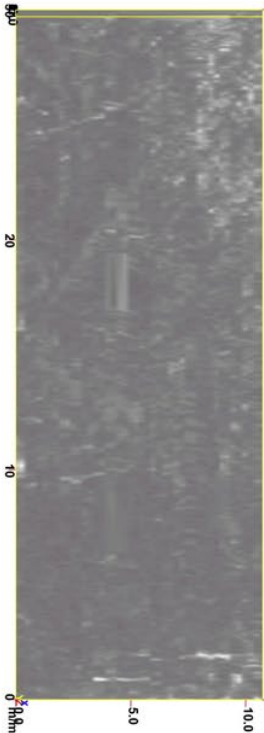
Grid 10 and 11

Grid 10 was located on the north side of the southern parking lot, just west of Grid 9. Multiple grave-like anomalies were observed between 90-130 cmbs across the entire Grid 10 area (Figure 6). Grid 11 was located adjacent to the western edge of Grid 10, in the same paved parking area. Multiple grave-like objects were observed between 80-130 cmbs (Figure 7), although they do not appear to extend across the entire Grid 11 area. This might indicate the western boundary of the cemetery property, although more GRP work is needed in other parts of the cemetery to properly delineate the burial area.

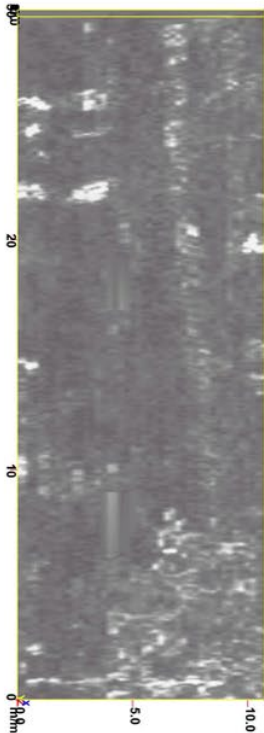

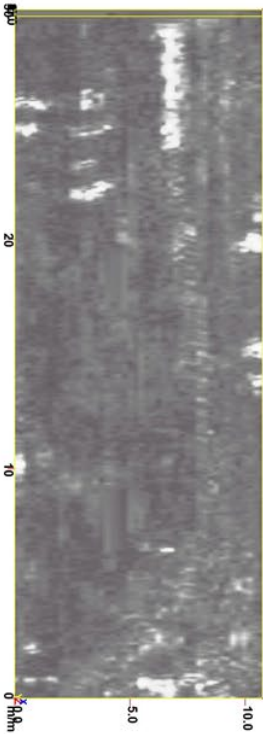

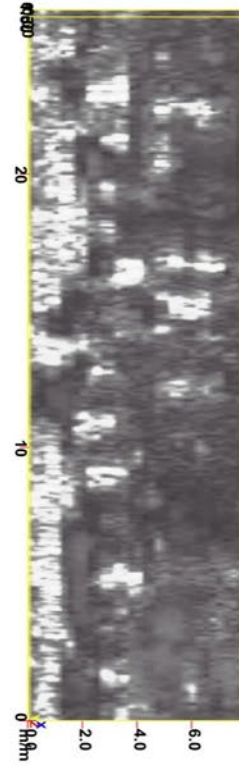

Figure 5 – Grid 9 results

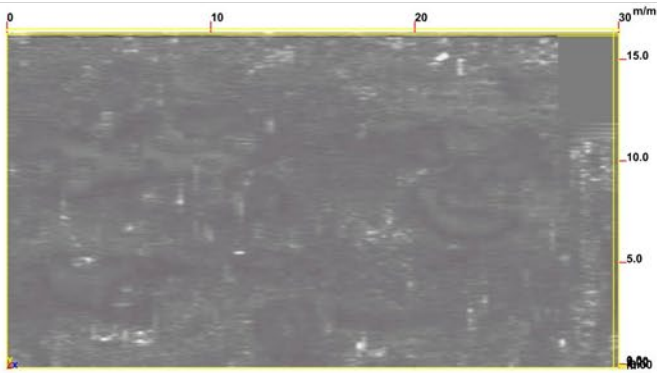

Figure 6 – Grid 10 results

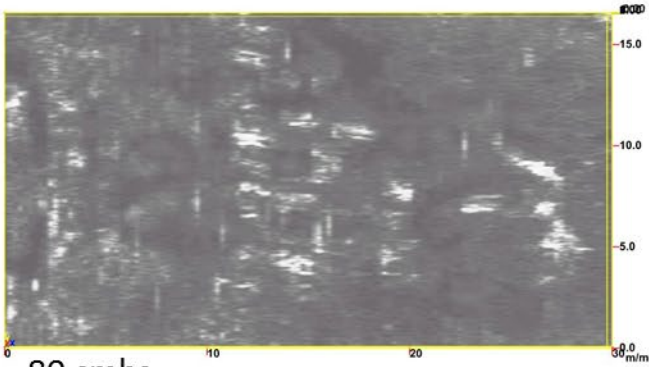

Legal Responsibilities

Human burials:

Whether on public or private lands, human remains and human burials are protected by law in the State of Florida. Florida Statute Ch.872, entitled Offenses Concerning Dead Bodies and Graves, is Florida's Human Burial law. Ch.872.02 provides explanations of the prohibited practices, penalties, and applications of the law related to burials.

Rights of relatives and descendants to visit cemeteries:

In Chapter 704 (Easements) of the Florida Statutes the rights of relatives and descendants to visit cemeteries is articulated. Ch.704.08 defines *Cemeteries: right of ingress and egress for visiting or maintenance*, and therein provides for the designation of an easement to relatives and descendants for the purpose of visiting a cemetery at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner.

Recommendations

- Seek to hire a cultural resource management consultant in order to continue geophysical investigations to define the extent of potential burials and delineate the boundaries of the potential burial area, and further, to develop an appropriate cemetery management plan for the property.
- Instruct consultant to begin process of consultation with African American community leaders, along with possible relatives and descendants, through direct lines of communication to begin to seek input and approval for further steps in verifying potential burials in selected areas through controlled excavation, if necessary, and for future needs.
- Conduct no ground disturbance in the area defined as a cemetery. Until boundaries of the burial area have been further delineated, the area defined in the November 15, 1954 City of Clearwater Commission meeting minutes [recorded as R. H. Padgett's Subdivision, E. 325 ft. of Lot 1] [as shown in the 1905 Padgett Plat] should be considered as the location of a historic African American cemetery.
- Additionally, as noted in the previous preliminary report of GPR survey dated February 14, 2020, a single anomaly was identified outside of the perceived cemetery boundary. Therefore it is recommended that no ground disturbance activities should be undertaken in this specific area as well until the anomaly has been further verified.
- Should ground disturbance activities commence in areas outside of the potential cemetery and an unexpected discovery of human remains occurs all activities shall cease immediately and contact with local sheriff's office and county/district medical examiner be made to report the discovery – as outlined in Ch.872.05.

History of St. Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery



The first St. Matthew First Baptist Church was built in 1904.

According to a Works Progress Administration (WPA) survey of churches conducted in the late 1930s and early 1940s, St. Matthew's Baptist Church of Clearwater was established in 1902 (WPA Church Records Collection, Florida Memory). However, a Clearwater Sun article from August 1980 on the 85th anniversary of the church indicates that it was established in 1895 (Figure 8) (Clearwater Sun Aug 2 1980). The church had a wood-frame building on Seminole Street in Clearwater and served the African American community of the area (WPA Church Records Collection, Florida Memory). The same congregation still exists today in a building built in the mid-1940s at the corner of Seminole Street and Railroad Avenue. On May 29, 1909 the church purchased 2.5 acres of land to be used as a cemetery from Robert Padgett, a former mayor of Clearwater and real estate dealer, for \$150. (Guzzo 2020) The cemetery property was located a little less than a mile southeast of the church in the Clearwater Heights area, with the original boundaries described as follows:

The East one-half (E 1/2) of Lot One (1) of Revised Map of R. H. Padgett's Subdivision of the SE ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 15, Township 29 South, Range 15 East, according to the map or plat thereof as recorded in Plat Book 5, Page 27 of the public records of Hillsborough County, Florida of which Pinellas County was formerly a part... (Figure 4)

Unlike other Clearwater cemeteries for white residents from the same era, St. Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery does not appear on any historical maps or city directories during the time it was in use. Only

two official documents mention its existence. The first is a City of Clearwater resolution from January of 1940 that established a new cemetery for African Americans in the North Greenwood neighborhood:

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the City Commission that the cemetery being used for the burial of negroes in Clearwater is inadequate and not well located for the purpose; and WHEREAS the City Commission has been requested to provide ground for a suitable negro cemetery and it is the desire of the City Commission to do so... [and] that after the above described property has been placed in suitable condition for use as a Negro Cemetery, no burials of negroes shall be permitted in Clearwater other than on the above described property. (City of Clearwater Resolution, January 2, 1940)

The resolution stated that the previous cemetery set aside for African Americans in Clearwater (St. Matthew's) had become inadequate for continued use as a cemetery, and established a new burial place in the North Greenwood neighborhood (the cemetery recently re-located on Holt avenue). It also stated that all burials should cease at St. Matthews once the North Greenwood cemetery was opened.

The second mention in a historic document comes 14 years later in 1954. Newspaper articles from the time detail an effort by the City of Clearwater to pave and improve streets throughout the City, including in African American neighborhoods. A Tampa Bay Times article from October 20, 1954 reported that the City Council saw the paving project as a way to continue segregationist housing practices within the city. By improving and paving roads in African American neighborhoods, Council members hoped that it would be an "inducement to confine Negro home building and purchasing to the existing area" (Tampa Bay Times 20 October 1954).

The document where St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery is specifically mentioned is a record of a City Commission meeting from November 15, 1954 detailing fee assessment for these improvements, including pavement and sewer, along Missouri Avenue between Court Street and Cleveland Street (Figure 9). Property owners were notified of the amount they owed to the City for the improvements along their property, and advised that if their assessments were not paid within 30 days that a lien would be placed on their property with an additional 8% interest rate per year. St. Matthew's Baptist Church was assessed \$1,251.07 for pavement and \$619.70 for sewer along the 330ft of the cemetery fronting Missouri Avenue. Also, the east 30 feet of the cemetery was conveyed to the City of Clearwater as road right of way for Missouri Avenue at this time, decreasing the overall size of the cemetery.

According to an affidavit signed in December of 1957 by Reverend H. V. Palmer of St Matthew's Baptist Church, the church Board of Trustees sold the cemetery property in May of 1955 to Milton D. Jones, Chester B. McMullen Jr, and T. R. Hudd for \$15,000. The money was used for much needed improvements to the church, and likely to pay off the lien for road improvements. Jones, McMullen Jr, and Hudd were the same individuals who were paid by the City of Clearwater to move burials from the North Greenwood Cemetery to a new cemetery they established in Dunedin called Parklawn in 1954. It is unclear how many burials were moved from St. Matthew's to Parklawn after they purchased the St. Matthew's property in 1955, but at least ten headstones at Parklawn Cemetery in Dunedin have been identified so far that match names of those originally buried at St Matthews Cemetery.

Around this time, Rogers Padgett, the grandson of Robert Padgett the original owner, remembers visiting the cemetery with his family. According to reporting by Paul Guzzo of the Tampa Bay Times the Padgett family were upset that the cemetery had been sold to a developer. "They parked on Missouri Avenue,

Padgett recalled, and walked about 50 yards through white sand overgrown with sand pine trees and myrtle bushes. ‘Suddenly, there were grave markers... Until I saw them, it didn’t look like a cemetery. The area we were in had about half a dozen stone markers, but none were big.’ Other graves, he said had temporary metal markers...” (Guzzo 2020).

In February of 1957, McMullen and Jones sold the cemetery property to Raymond L. Round for \$110,000, a \$95,000 profit on their investment. In December of 1959 Round sold the same property to Sapier Investment Co. for \$105,000 which then developed a Montgomery Wards store in that location. In order to make the new store more accessible, the City of Clearwater approved the extension of Pierce Street east toward Missouri, to the south of the store and through what was once the cemetery, in May of 1961. Construction of the Montgomery Wards started in late 1961, and the store opened in February of 1962.

Cemetery Description

According to historical documents and deeds, St. Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery covers approximately 2.5 acres within the east half of Lot 1, of R. H. Padgett’s Subdivision, Section 15, Township 29 South, Range 15 East. In 1954 the eastern 30 feet of the cemetery was conveyed to the City of Clearwater for road right of way along Missouri Avenue (today this would be the southbound lanes of Missouri Avenue). Memories from area residents and descendants of those buried in the cemetery, as well as historical aerials, are also important to gaining a better understanding of what the cemetery looked like through time.

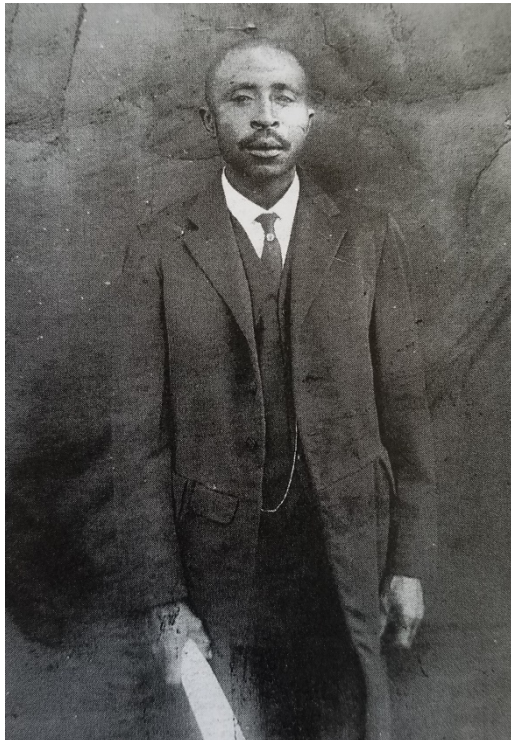


Figure 10 – Aerial photographs showing the St Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery location through time from 1926 to 2020.

Figure 10 is a compilation of aerial photographs through time of the cemetery property. The approximate boundaries of the cemetery are marked with a red box. In 1926, cleared areas throughout the cemetery show up in stark contrast as bright white spots due to the area’s sandy soils, these areas might have been cleared for family plots or burial areas. Multiple foot paths can be seen throughout the immediate vicinity and in and around the cemetery. In 1942 the area appears to have been cleared of most of the vegetation except for several large trees and other groundcover. A north/south path or dirt road bisects the middle of the cemetery along with other cleared paths bounding the margins of the property.

The cemetery appears to be fairly open with less vegetation visible in the 1951 aerial. In the same photograph, a new school is visible to the southwest of the cemetery property. In 1957, the east 30 feet of the cemetery has already been conveyed to the City of Clearwater as part of the paving of Missouri Avenue, which looks to have been extended to Cleveland Street at that time. The amount of vegetation on the property appears to have increased, and development of the surrounding area has also increased significantly. At this time the property is owned either by McMullen Jr or Raymond Round. In 1968 the area changes dramatically, with the construction of the Montgomery Wards altering the northwest corner of the cemetery, and the rest of the property covered by an asphalt parking lot. Today, the cemetery is covered partially by parking lots and roads, along with grassy areas, landscaping beds, and a small portion of one of the Frank Crum company buildings along the northwest margin.

People Buried at St Matthews Baptist Church Cemetery

As with any historic cemetery, we will never know the name of every single individual who was once buried at the St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery. However, death certificates, funeral home records, obituaries, and military records have provided 545 names of individuals likely buried in this cemetery between 1915 and 1951. More research should be done to try to find additional names, but this list gives us a good place to start in understanding who was buried at St Matthew's as well as possible descendants of these individuals. Only three burial records identified so far (two death certificates and one military headstone request) mention St Matthews Baptist Church Cemetery by name. The majority of those included in Appendix A have "Clearwater Colored Cemetery", "Colored Cemetery", or "Clearwater" as their place of burial. During the time St Matthews Cemetery was in most active use (1909-1940) it was likely the only cemetery within the city of Clearwater open to African Americans. Another historic African American cemetery, the Safety Harbor African American Cemetery, was in operation at this time but much farther away while the North Greenwood Cemetery near Stevenson Creek did not start operation until sometime in 1940. With this in mind, African Americans who passed away in Clearwater or have their burial place listed as Clearwater between 1909-1940 would likely have been buried at what we now know is the St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery in the Clearwater Heights area along Missouri Ave. Below are just a few of the individuals laid to rest in this cemetery by their loved ones, their stories are based on archival documents like death certificates, military enlistment records, census data, city directories, and newspaper articles. None of these short descriptions should be taken as a full picture of any of their lives, as the stories and memories of their families and descendants have not been included, but it is hoped that this information can start to shine a light on the people of St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery.

Rev. Arthur L. Jackson (1874- 1932)



Arthur Lang Jackson was born on November 16, 1874 in Archer, FL, a rural farming community in Alachua County with a sizable African American community. In 1893 he married Della Mae Haines and they had at least six children: Carrie, Jessie Maria, Junius, Emma Katina, Clealia, and Foye. Rev. Jackson moved to Clearwater in 1918 with his family and according to a book about the history of Black communities in Clearwater (Rook and Lightfoot 2002) was the co-founder of the Mt. Zion Methodist Episcopal Church in 1919. He and "Rev. J.S. Todd came to Clearwater and found two missions serving without a permanent church home. One was serving in a small house and the other in the Methodist mission... The members worked together and decided to purchase two lots so that they could be centrally located and worship together" (Rook and Lightfoot 2002:15). Rev. Jackson died April 29, 1932 at the age of 57 while out of town in Fort Myers. The place of burial on his death certificate is listed as "Clearwater".

Infant Woodridge (1931)

On June 30, 1931 a baby boy was born to Peter and Emma Woodridge. The Woodridges were originally from South Carolina but in 1931 they were living in the Greenwood Park neighborhood of Clearwater. The baby was stillborn, and no undertaker was recorded on the death certificate, so it is likely that the baby was buried by family and loved ones. Although his life was tragically short this baby gives us important information about the history of this cemetery. His death certificate is one of the only ones identified to list "St Matthew's Cemetery" as the place of burial.

William Yopp (1914-1951)

William Yopp was born August 31, 1914 in Dexter, Georgia. According to his military enlistment card from 1940 he lived at 109 Madison Ave, Clearwater with his wife Vivian Yopp and worked at the Clearwater Mattress Factory on Myrtle Avenue. He served in the 1323rd Engineers General Service Regiment during WWII then re-enlisted in the Enlisted Reserve Corps in 1945. He was honorably discharged in 1948 after rising to the rank of Master Sergeant. When he passed away in April of 1951, Vivian applied for a headstone from the Veterans Administration. The headstone was an upright marble headstone and the name of the cemetery it was delivered to was "St Matthew's Cemetery". This is one of the only other death or burial-related documents that lists the name "St Matthew's Cemetery". Today, you can find William Yopp's headstone at Parklawn Cemetery in Dunedin where it was presumably moved around 1955 from its original location at the St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery in Clearwater.

James Yopp (1894-1926)

James "Jimmie" Yopp was born in Dexter, Georgia on October 14, 1894 to Jule and Rosella Yopp. His WWI draft card lists him as being exempt from the draft because he was blind in both eyes. Despite this challenge, Jimmie learned to play the piano and was skilled enough to earn his living as a Piano Player. His death certificate lists his occupation as "Piano Player (Totally Blind)". Jimmie Yopp died in Clearwater on July 22, 1926 at the age of 31 from heart disease. He was buried by the Alexander funeral home in the "Clearwater Colored Cemetery".

Thomas Jefferson Rembert (1880-1930)

Thomas Jefferson "Jeff" Rembert was born in Bishopville, South Carolina in 1880 to Abraham and Hannah Rembert. Jefferson married Bessie Mae Walker (1890-1962) and they had eight children: William J. (1911-1957), Ruth E. (1913-1989), Algie A. (1915-1960), Fred Douglas (1916-2006), Quentin T. (1919-1966), James C. (1922-Present), Nell Louise (1925-2008), and Timothy Paul (1927-1992). The 1920 census records Jeff Rembert working as a Drayman (delivery man) in Clearwater, while on the 1930 census he was recorded as working as a waiter in a hotel. At the time of his death in November of 1930 Mr. Rembert was living at 403 Greenwood Ave, Clearwater with his family. His place of burial was listed on his death certificate as "Clearwater" and the undertaker was the Williams Funeral Home. One of Jeff and Bessie Rembert's children is still living in Clearwater today. James C. Rembert is 99 years old and lives near Stevenson Creek and the North Greenwood neighborhood in Clearwater.

Gabriel and Charity Thomas Family

Gabriel Bristol Thomas (1834-1916) and Charity Ophelia Foster Thomas (1843-1934) moved to the Clearwater area with their children in 1896 from the Lake Weir area just southeast of Ocala in Marion

County. The two were born in Georgia, with Gabriel hailing from the area of Columbus, GA, and had at least eight children: Mary, Rosa Bell, George, Bessie, Lizzie, William, Mitchell, and Eliza. Gabriel Thomas worked as a farmer and passed away on May 12, 1916 at the age of 82 years old from a seizure and paralysis brought on by recurrent malaria. Mr. Thomas was likely an important elder in the community, but Charity Thomas appears to have played a much more active role.

“Aunt Charity” Thomas, as she was known by some, worked for 15 years at the Belleview Biltmore hotel in Belleair according to a newspaper article from 1928 declaring that she was very ill at the time (Tampa Tribune, 27 July 1928). She was so popular with the wealthy guests of the hotel that the comfortable home she owned in the Belmont area south of downtown Clearwater “was largely furnished with gifts from her patrons” at the Biltmore (Tampa Bay Times 2000). Unlike many of the African American people buried at the St Matthews Baptist Church cemetery, Charity Thomas appears in several newspaper articles during her lifetime. African Americans were often ignored by white newspapers at this time, and when they did appear it was usually to support racist tropes or stereotypes. Charity, however, had an important acquaintance at the Tampa Tribune: Col. W. F. Stovall the lead Editor and Manager of the paper (Tampa Tribune 12 Aug 1923). As a young boy, Mr. Stovall grew up near the Thomas Family in Lake Weir and “often stopped at her home”. Besides being a prominent community member, Charity is also important to the story of this cemetery because in her obituary she is described as one of the founders of the St Matthew’s Baptist Church (Tampa Bay Times 8 Dec 1934), where she had her funeral service and in whose cemetery she was likely laid to rest with her husband and at least three of her daughters. Her death certificate lists her burial place as “Clearwater Col. Cemetery”.

Rosa Bell Thomas (1877-1919) worked as a cook at the Belleview Biltmore hotel along with her mother, Charity. On February 25th, 1919 Rosa was walking outside the hotel when she was struck and killed by the Belleview Hotel bus, according to her death certificate. She was 42 years old when she was laid to rest in the “Colored Cemetery” in Clearwater.

Eliza Thomas (1897-1930) was the youngest daughter of Charity and Gabriel Thomas, but her story is much more tragic than that of her parents or siblings. At around 8pm on the night of February 5, 1930 an unidentified white man knocked on the door of the Thomas home and Lettia Bailey, a boarder in the home, answered the door. The man asked if Eliza was home, so Lettia went to get her and when Eliza came to the door the man fired a shot gun and killed Eliza. At a later coroner’s inquest Lettia testified that “she had never seen [the man] before and could not identify if she saw him again” (Tampa Bay Times 8 Feb 1930) but another witness said he saw “a big car from Plant City and... two men” in the neighborhood. Eliza’s murder was never solved, but she was laid to rest with her family in the “Clearwater Colored Cemetery”.

Mary Thomas-Brewer (1872-1939) moved north with her husband Thomas Brewer and settled on Juniper Ave in Queens, New York City. It is unclear if she had any children, but when she passed away in May of 1939 Mary’s body was shipped back to Clearwater to be buried with her family. The name of the cemetery listed on her death certificate is “St Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery”. This is only the second death certificate of the 545 to list St Matthew’s by name, and it is doubly significant because it indicates that the “Clearwater Colored Cemetery” and “Colored Cemetery” where her parents and sisters were buried are in fact one and the same as the “St Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery” listed on Mary’s New-York-issued death certificate. In contemporary cemeteries, and even still today, family plots are the norm - sometimes

with multiple generations of family members being laid to rest nearby one another. Mary would have undoubtedly wanted to be buried in the same cemetery as the rest of her family.

Rev. Joseph Hines (1884-1934)



Joseph Hines was born in North Carolina in 1884, and lived at 1111 Tangerine St, Clearwater with his wife Callie Lane who was from Georgia (1890-unknown). According to the 1930 census Callie worked as a hairdresser and Joseph was a Baptist Minister. They had one son, Joseph Herman Hines (1919-1979). The picture at left shows Rev. Hines (at center and dressed in a black robe) getting ready to perform baptisms in Stevenson Creek in 1934. Rev. Hines was the first permanent minister of St John Missionary Baptist Church (Rooks and Lightfoot 2002:28).

Mary Reddish (1875-1931)

According to her death certificate, Mary Reddish was born July 4, 1875 in Ocala, Florida. It's unclear what her maiden name was but in 1890 she married Thomas Reddish and they had three children: Savannah Reddish-Livingston (1897-1957), Mary Reddish-Rhymes (1901-1934), and Joseph Reddish (1902-unknown). At the time of her death at the age of 56 from tuberculosis in December of 1931 she was living at 1215 N Railroad Ave in Clearwater with her husband.

Mary is particularly important to the story of the Clearwater Heights neighborhood and the St Matthew's Cemetery as she was a midwife who served these communities. Because of segregationist laws at the time African American women did not have the same access to prenatal care or hospitals where they could give birth. Mary Reddish served an important role in providing care to those who might not be able to obtain it elsewhere. Her name appears on many of the death certificates for stillborn infants buried at St Matthew's Cemetery, and she also used her skills to help local African American women through the successful delivery of their babies. Her daughter Mary Reddish-Rhymes (1901-1934) and three of her grandchildren (Thomas Livingston 1917-1918, Neoma Rhymes 1925, and a grandson Rhymes 1926) are also buried in the St Matthew's cemetery.

Hester Wilson (1853-1926)

Hester Wilson was born around 1853 in South Carolina, but at the time of her death she was living in Dunedin, Florida. On 28 February 1926 she succumbed to stomach cancer at the age of 73 and was laid to rest in the "Clearwater Colored Cemetery" by the Alexander Funeral Home.

The Dixon Family

No history of the St Matthews Baptist Church Cemetery or the Clearwater Heights neighborhood would be complete without at least a mention of Mack Dixon and the Dixon family. Mack Dixon was born in March of 1877 in Martel, just outside of Ocala, Florida. He married Florence Adams sometime around 1890 and the two had at least 15 children: Ada Dixon-Isaac (1886-1937), Leroy (1890-1983), Viola (1890-unknown), Harry (1892- unknown), Ora (1895-unknown), Loubertha (1896- unknown), Mack Jr. (1896-1981), Inez (1901-1918), Ruby Dixon-Keene (1902-1998), Florence Dixon-Belcher (1903-1966), Roosevelt (1905-1980), Florida Dixon-Holmes (1907- unknown), Theodore (1907-1998), and Samuel Rufus (1909- unknown), and Alberta Dixon-Floyd (unknown-1919). Mr. Dixon brought his family from Hampton, Florida to the Clearwater area in the early 1900s and through money he earned as a train conductor as well as other jobs he purchased a large parcel of land in the Clearwater Heights area that he then platted as the “Mack Dixon Subdivision” (Rooks and Lightfoot

2002:10). The 1926 Clearwater City Directory lists Mr. Dixon as the proprietor of the Dixie Theatre. According to his death certificate Mack Dixon passed away in February of 1939 at the age of 61 years old. His place of burial is listed as "Clearwater", and his undertaker was the Williams Funeral Home. Today, his headstone is at Parklawn Cemetery in Dunedin.



Florence Adams-Dixon (pictured at left around 1905) was born in November of 1867, likely in Bradford County, Florida, to Patrick and Hester Adams both of South Carolina. According to the 1926 City Directory, Florence made a home with her husband and children on S. Greenwood Ave in Clearwater. She passed away on March 24, 1932 at the age of 65 from complications of diabetes, according to her death certificate. Her place of burial is listed as "Clearwater".

At least three of Mack and Florence's children, and two of their grandchildren, were buried with them at the St Matthew's Cemetery. Alberta Dixon-Floyd died of influenza in the 1919 pandemic and is listed as being buried in "Clearwater" on her death certificate, as is her sister Ada Dixon-Isaac who died in 1937 at Morton Plant Hospital after a fatal car accident. Inez Dixon passed away in 1918 of pneumonia and was buried in the "Colored Cemetery" in Clearwater. Coraline (1930) and Luther May (1928-1929), Florence and Mack's grandchildren via Florida Dixon, are both listed as being buried in the "Clearwater Colored Cemetery".

Walter Sands (1863-1930)

According to his death certificate, Walter Sands was born in Nassau, Bahamas in 1863. He likely immigrated to the United States with his wife around 1880 and worked in Key West as a Sponger, according to the 1900 census. At some point between 1900 and 1913 he moved to the Clearwater area, likely to find work in the sponge industry around Tarpon Springs. Very little information is recorded on his death certificate about his life however, because he died at the Pinellas County Home in Largo. At least 12 people buried at the St Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery died at the County Home. Prior to the implementation of the Social Security Act in 1935, and even after that as this act did not cover certain job types that had disproportionate numbers of African American workers, the Federal Government did not provide any assistance to the old, sick, or poor (Prentice Thomas and Assoc. 2016: 45). Florida gave each county the responsibility to care for those who were too old or sick to provide for themselves, leading to the creation of Poor Farms and County Homes like the one run by Pinellas County in Largo. The "inmates" of these institutions often had to do physical labor to stay there, and food and medical care were often meager (Prentice Thomas and Assoc. 2016). Walter Sands died at the County Home on November 6, 1930 at the age of 67 of a cerebral hemorrhage brought on by arteriosclerosis, high blood pressure, and chronic nephritis.

Introduction

An additional ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey and investigation was conducted in February/March 2020 by archaeologists with the Florida Public Archaeology Network (FPAN) at the Frank Crum Staff Leasing Campus located at 100 S. Missouri Ave in Clearwater, Florida.

In 2019, Clearwater-area residents and other local informants reported that a historic African American cemetery is located on the Frank Crum property. As reported, the cemetery was thought to be located in the southern portion of the property, currently an unused and open lot vacant of any buildings. Initial GPR investigation took place in January 2020 of this portion of the property (Grids 1-5) and did not reveal the presence of potential burials, albeit a lone suspicious anomaly (See attachment). During this initial survey, however, archaeologists received further information that revealed details of the cemetery's more probable location. This new information led to the additional survey. The results of which are presented in this preliminary report.

The additional survey areas (Grids 6-11) are shown in Figure 1. No gravestones or other visible grave markers are present within either of the surveyed areas. The additional survey areas consist of the main entrance to the Frank Crum campus, an access road to the north of main entrance, an adjacent grassy area along the eastern boundary of the campus (also north of the main entrance), and an asphalt-covered temporary parking lot (just south and west of the main entrance) . The purpose of the investigation was to use geophysical methods (GPR) to determine the potential for unmarked graves. Archaeologists performed the survey over two days, February 29-March 1, 2020.

Description of Geophysical Method

FPAN staff conducted a ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey of selected areas within the designated project area using a SIR-3000 GPR manufactured by GSSI, Inc. and outfitted with a 400-MHz antenna. Six grids were completed in total, with Grids 7-11 located on the paved road and staff parking areas. Grid 6 was located in the grass-covered area inside the property to the north of the main entrance. (See Figure 1 for Grid locations). The results of grids 6-11 are reported here.

GPR survey grids varied in size and shape but all data were collected in the same manner: uni-directional north-south transects spaced at .25 meters (approximately 10 inches) east-west along a baseline, with 512 samples per scan, and a time window of 50ns. Given the capabilities and limitations of the SIR 3000 unit, we designed the survey to optimize our ability to detect potential sub-surface historic cemetery features and burials. With Christian burials, graves are often laid out in an east-west orientation typically two to six feet beneath the surface. By using north-south survey transects we hoped to cross any potential burials at a perpendicular angle across their short axis, allowing for the clearest possible reflections. The relatively small transverse interval, .25 meters between each survey transect, was also necessary due to the potential for child or infant burials within the cemetery. Survey transect intervals should generally be designed to be smaller than the long axis of the potential objects being studied

The SIR 3000 data were post-processed by FPAN staff using GSSI's Radan 7 software package. Each transect was processed using the following steps, then brought together to create a "3D" or horizontal view of each survey area: 1) Time Zero Correction, 2) Full-Pass Background Removal, 3) Gain Adjustment, 4) FIR High-Low Bandpass Filter, and 5) Kirchhoff Migration to resolve hyperbolas into their

point sources. Depth slice images were created for every 10 cm in increasing depth below the ground surface, intermediate slices were created as needed or when distinct anomalies were observed between the 10 cm intervals.

Survey Results

Analysis of the processed GPR data indicates the presence of potential burials throughout each of the additional survey grids (Grids 6-11). The characteristics of the potential burials are consistent with the size, shape, depth, and patterning of coffin burials found within a historic cemetery. See Figures 2 and 3 for GPR results of Grids 6-11 at between 75 to 125 cmbs (centimeters below surface) (approximately 2.5 to 4 feet below ground surface).

The potential burials are characterized by a rectangular shape with long axis oriented in an east/west direction. These objects average 5 to 6 feet in length and are organized in rows or grouped in clusters. The depth of these potential burials vary within the additional survey grids due to modern modifications in surface grade from one area to another. The most shallow begin at less than 3 feet below current ground surface; whereas the more deeply buried begin at approximately between 4 to 5 feet below the ground surface.

In addition to the presence of potential burials archaeologists also identified several different types of buried objects throughout survey grids 6-11. These objects consist of buried pipes, utility lines, and associated construction trenches. In Figure 3, stormwater drains are referenced in light blue and have been cross-referenced with City of Clearwater engineering department maps.

All of the potential burials are located within the expected boundaries of the cemetery. More investigation is necessary, however, to determine the full extent of potential burials and boundaries of the cemetery. Additional survey Grids 6-11 sampled only a portion of the suspected area in order to determine presence or absence of potential burials.

Legal Responsibilities

Human burials:

Whether on public or private lands, human remains and human burials are protected by law in the State of Florida. Florida Statute Ch.872, entitled Offenses Concerning Dead Bodies and Graves, is Florida's Human Burial law. Ch.872.02 provides explanations of the prohibited practices, penalties, and applications of the law related to burials.

Rights of relatives and descendants to visit cemeteries:

In Chapter 704 (Easements) of the Florida Statutes the rights of relatives and descendants to visit cemeteries is articulated. Ch.704.08 defines *Cemeteries: right of ingress and egress for visiting or maintenance*, and therein provides for the designation of an easement to relatives and descendants for the purpose of visiting a cemetery at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner.

Recommendations

- Seek to hire a cultural resource management consultant in order to continue geophysical investigations to define the extent of potential burials and delineate the boundaries of the potential burial area, and further, to develop an appropriate cemetery management plan for the property.
- Instruct consultant to begin process of consultation with African American community leaders, along with possible relatives and descendants, through direct lines of communication to begin to seek input and approval for further steps in verifying potential burials in selected areas through controlled excavation, if necessary, and for future needs.
- Conduct no ground disturbance in the area defined as a cemetery. Until boundaries of the burial area have been further delineated, the area defined in the November 15, 1954 City of Clearwater Commission meeting minutes [recorded as R. H. Padgett's Subdivision, E. 325 ft. of Lot 1] [as shown in the 1905 Padgett Plat] should be considered as the location of a historic African American cemetery.
- Additionally, as noted in the previous preliminary report of GPR survey dated February 14, 2020, a single anomaly was identified outside of the perceived cemetery boundary. Therefore it is recommended that no ground disturbance activities should be undertaken in this specific area as well until the anomaly has been further verified.
- Should ground disturbance activities commence in areas outside of the potential cemetery and an unexpected discovery of human remains occurs all activities shall cease immediately and contact with local sheriff's office and county/district medical examiner be made to report the discovery – as outlined in Ch.872.05.

History of St. Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery

According to a Works Progress Administration (WPA) survey of churches conducted in the late 1930s and early 1940s, St. Matthew's Baptist Church of Clearwater was established in 1902 (WPA Church Records Collection, Florida Memory). The church had a wood-frame building on Seminole Street in Clearwater and served the African American community of the area (WPA Church Records Collection, Florida Memory). The same congregation still exists today in a slightly newer building at the corner of Seminole Street and Railroad Avenue. On May 29, 1909 the church purchased 2.5 acres of land to be used as a cemetery from Robert Padgett, a former mayor of Clearwater and real estate dealer, for \$150. (Guzzo, 2020) The cemetery property was located a little less than a mile southeast of the church in the Clearwater Heights area, with the original boundaries described as follows:

The East one-half (E 1/2) of Lot One (1) of Revised Map of R. H. Padgett's Subdivision of the SE ¼ of the NW ¼ of Section 15, Township 29 South, Range 15 East, according to the

map or plat thereof as recorded in Plat Book 5, Page 27 of the public records of Hillsborough County, Florida of which Pinellas County was formerly a part... (Figure 4)

Additional names used for this cemetery at the time were “Clearwater Colored Cemetery” and “Colored Cemetery” (Pinellas Genealogy Society 2005). An initial search of burial records from the Alexander Funeral Home, located in Clearwater, has turned up 206 individuals buried in the cemetery between 1915 and 1937 (Pinellas 2005). This is unlikely to be the final total, however, because the cemetery was in use from at least 1909 to 1940 and other funeral homes could have been burying there as well. More research is needed to locate additional burial records, as well as to determine if burials were ever moved from this cemetery to other cemeteries in the area. An initial search using Find A Grave has turned up only four headstones located in Parklawn Cemetery (in Dunedin) that match names of those buried in St. Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery.

Unlike other Clearwater cemeteries for white residents from the same era, St. Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery does not appear on any historical maps or city directories during the time it was in use. Only two official documents mention its existence. The first is a City of Clearwater resolution from January of 1940 that established a new cemetery for African Americans in the North Greenwood neighborhood:

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the City Commission that the cemetery being used for the burial of negroes in Clearwater is inadequate and not well located for the purpose; and WHEREAS the City Commission has been requested to provide ground for a suitable negro cemetery and it is the desire of the City Commission to do so... [and] that after the above described property has been placed in suitable condition for use as a Negro Cemetery, no burials of negroes shall be permitted in Clearwater other than on the above described property. (City of Clearwater Resolution, January 2, 1940)

The resolution stated that the previous cemetery set aside for African Americans in Clearwater (St. Matthew’s) had become inadequate for continued use as a cemetery, and established a new burial place in the North Greenwood neighborhood (the cemetery recently re-located on Holt avenue). It also stated that all burials should cease at St. Matthews once the North Greenwood cemetery was opened.

The second mention in a historic document comes 14 years later in 1954. Newspaper articles from the time detail an effort by the City of Clearwater to pave and improve streets throughout the City, including in African American neighborhoods. A Tampa Bay Times article from October 20, 1954 reported that the City Council saw the paving project as a way to continue segregationist housing practices within the city. By improving and paving roads in African American neighborhoods, Council members hoped that it would be an “inducement to confine Negro home building and purchasing to the existing area.”

The document where St Matthew’s Baptist Church Cemetery is specifically mentioned is a record of a City Commission meeting from November 15, 1954 detailing fee assessment for these improvements, including pavement and sewer, along Missouri Avenue between Court Street and Cleveland Street. Property owners were notified of the amount they owed to the City for the improvements along their property, and advised that if their assessments were not paid within 30 days that a lien would be placed on their property with an additional 8% interest rate per year. St. Matthew’s Baptist Church was assessed \$1,251.07 for pavement and \$619.70 for sewer along the 330ft of the cemetery fronting Missouri Avenue. Also, the east 30 feet of the cemetery was conveyed to the City of Clearwater as road right of way for Missouri Avenue at this time, decreasing the overall size of the cemetery.

According to an affidavit signed in December of 1957 by Reverend H. V. Palmer of St Matthew's Baptist Church, the church Board of Trustees sold the cemetery property in May of 1955 to Milton D. Jones, Chester B. McMullen Jr, and T. R. Hudd for \$15,000. The money was used for much needed improvements to the church, and likely to pay off the lien for road improvements. Jones, McMullen Jr, and Hudd were the same individuals who were paid by the City of Clearwater to move burials from the North Greenwood Cemetery to a new cemetery they established in Dunedin called Parklawn in 1954. It is unclear how many burials were moved from St. Matthew's to Parklawn after they purchased the St. Matthew's property in 1955.

Around this time, Rogers Padgett, the grandson of Robert Padgett the original owner, remembers visiting the cemetery with his family. According to reporting by Paul Guzzo of the Tampa Bay Times the Padgett family were upset that the cemetery had been sold to a developer. "They parked on Missouri Avenue, Padgett recalled, and walked about 50 yards through white sand overgrown with sand pine trees and myrtle bushes. 'Suddenly, there were grave markers... Until I saw them, it didn't look like a cemetery. The area we were in had about half a dozen stone markers, but none were big.' Other graves, he said had temporary metal markers..." (Guzzo, 2020).

In February of 1957, McMullen and Jones sold the cemetery property to Raymond L. Round for \$110,000, a \$95,000 profit on their investment. In December of 1959 Round sold the same property to Sapier Investment Co. for \$105,000 which then developed a Montgomery Wards store in that location. In order to make the new store more accessible, the City of Clearwater approved the extension of Pierce Street east toward Missouri, to the south of the store and through what was once the cemetery, in May of 1961. Construction of the Montgomery Wards started in late 1961, and the store opened in February of 1962.

Cemetery Description

According to historic documents and deeds, St. Matthew's Baptist Church Cemetery covers approximately 2.5 acres within the east half of Lot 1, of R. H. Padgett's Subdivision, Section 15, Township 29 South, Range 15 East. In 1954 the eastern 30 feet of the cemetery was conveyed to the City of Clearwater for road right of way along Missouri Avenue (today this would be the southbound lanes of Missouri Avenue). Memories from area residents and descendants of those buried in the cemetery, as well as historical aeriels, are also important to gaining a better understanding of what the cemetery looked like through time.

Figure 5 is a compilation of aerial photographs through time of the cemetery property. The approximate boundaries of the cemetery are marked with a red box. In 1926, cleared areas throughout the cemetery show up in stark contrast as bright white spots due to the area's sandy soils, these areas might have been cleared for family plots or burial areas. Multiple foot paths can be seen throughout the immediate vicinity and in and around the cemetery. In 1942 the area appears to have been cleared of most of the vegetation except for several large trees and other groundcover. A north/south path or dirt road is also apparent bisecting the middle of the cemetery along with other cleared paths bounding the margins of the property.

The cemetery appears to be fairly open with less vegetation visible in the 1951 aerial. In the same photograph, a new school is visible to the southwest of the cemetery property. In 1957, the east 30 feet of the cemetery has already been conveyed to the City of Clearwater as part of the paving of Missouri Avenue, which looks to have been extended to Cleveland Street at that time. The amount of vegetation on the property appears to have increased, and development of the surrounding area has also increased significantly. At this time the property is owned either by McMullen Jr or Raymond Round. In 1968 the area changes dramatically, with the construction of the Montgomery Wards altering the northwest corner of the cemetery, and the rest of the property covered by an asphalt parking lot. Today, the cemetery is covered partially by parking lots and roads, along with grassy areas, landscaping beds, and a small portion of one of the Frank Crum company buildings along the northwest margin.

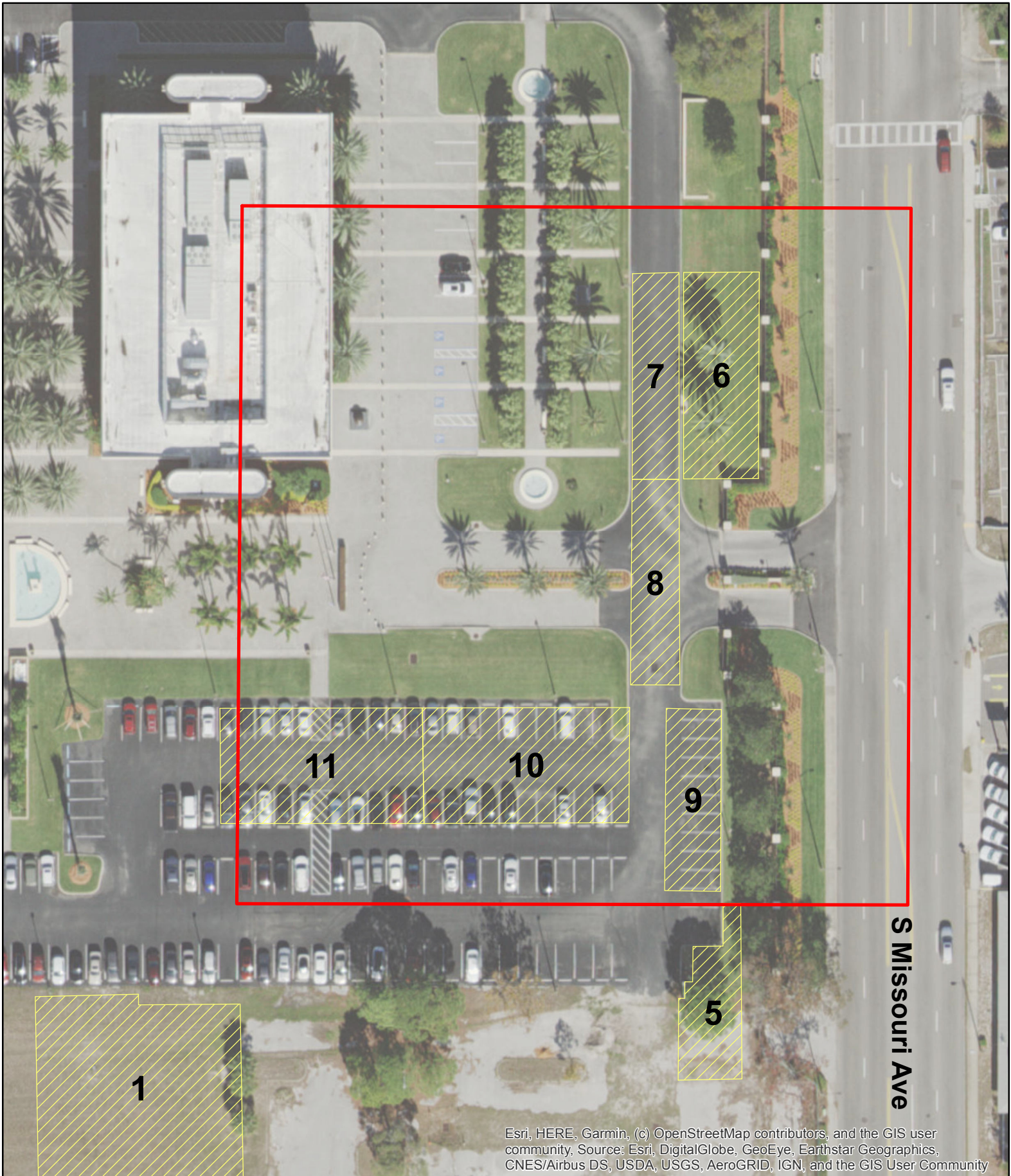
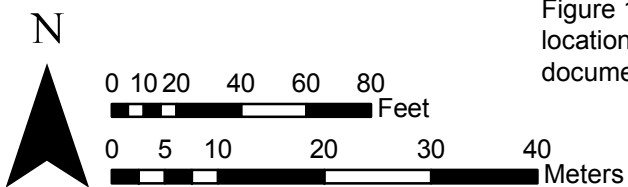
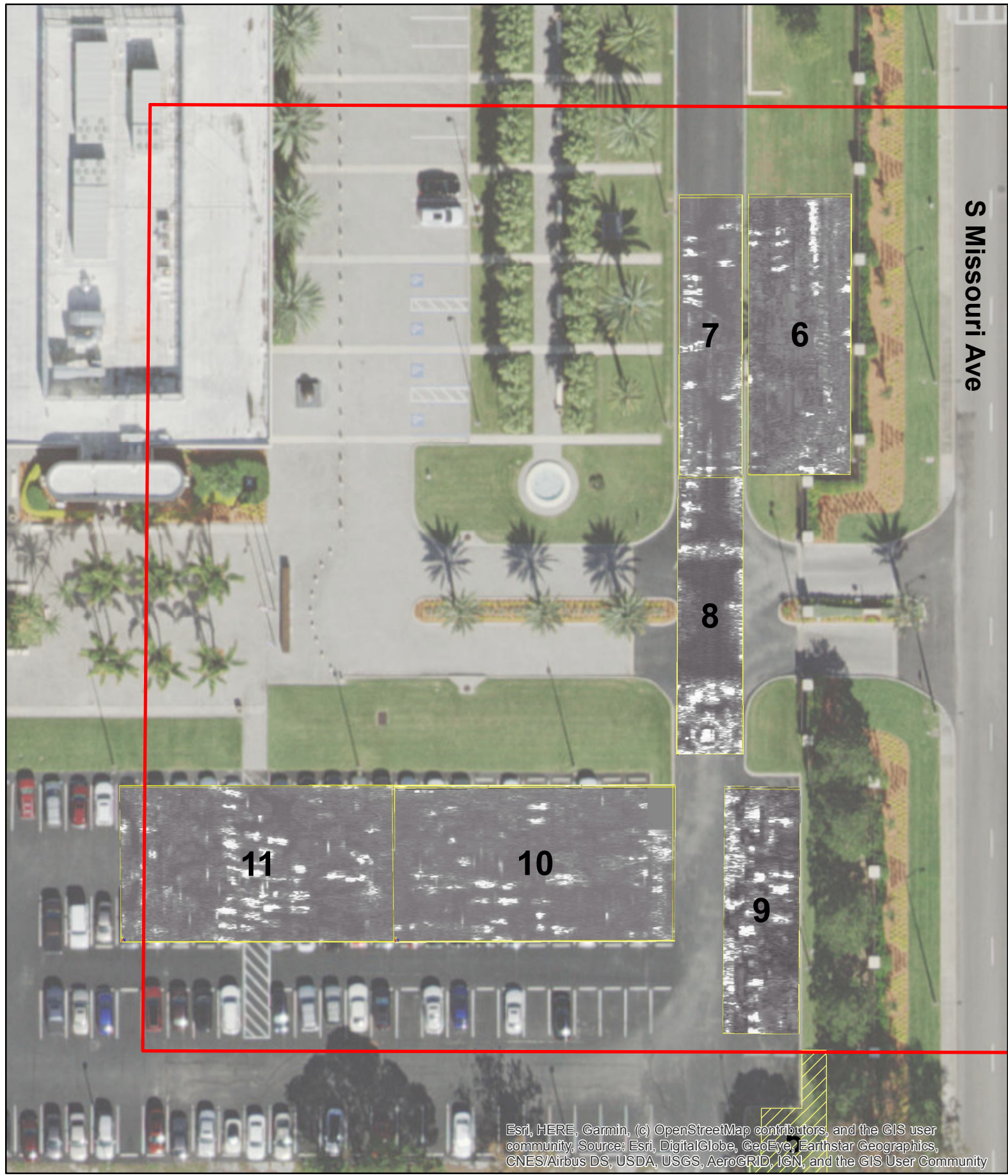


Figure 1: Additional GPR survey grid locations. Areas marked in yellow are survey locations, area marked in red is the potential cemetery location based on historic documents.

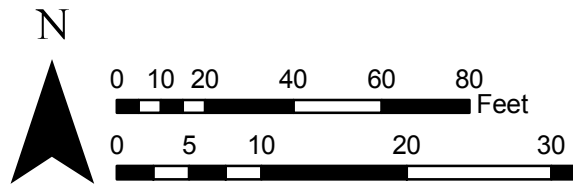


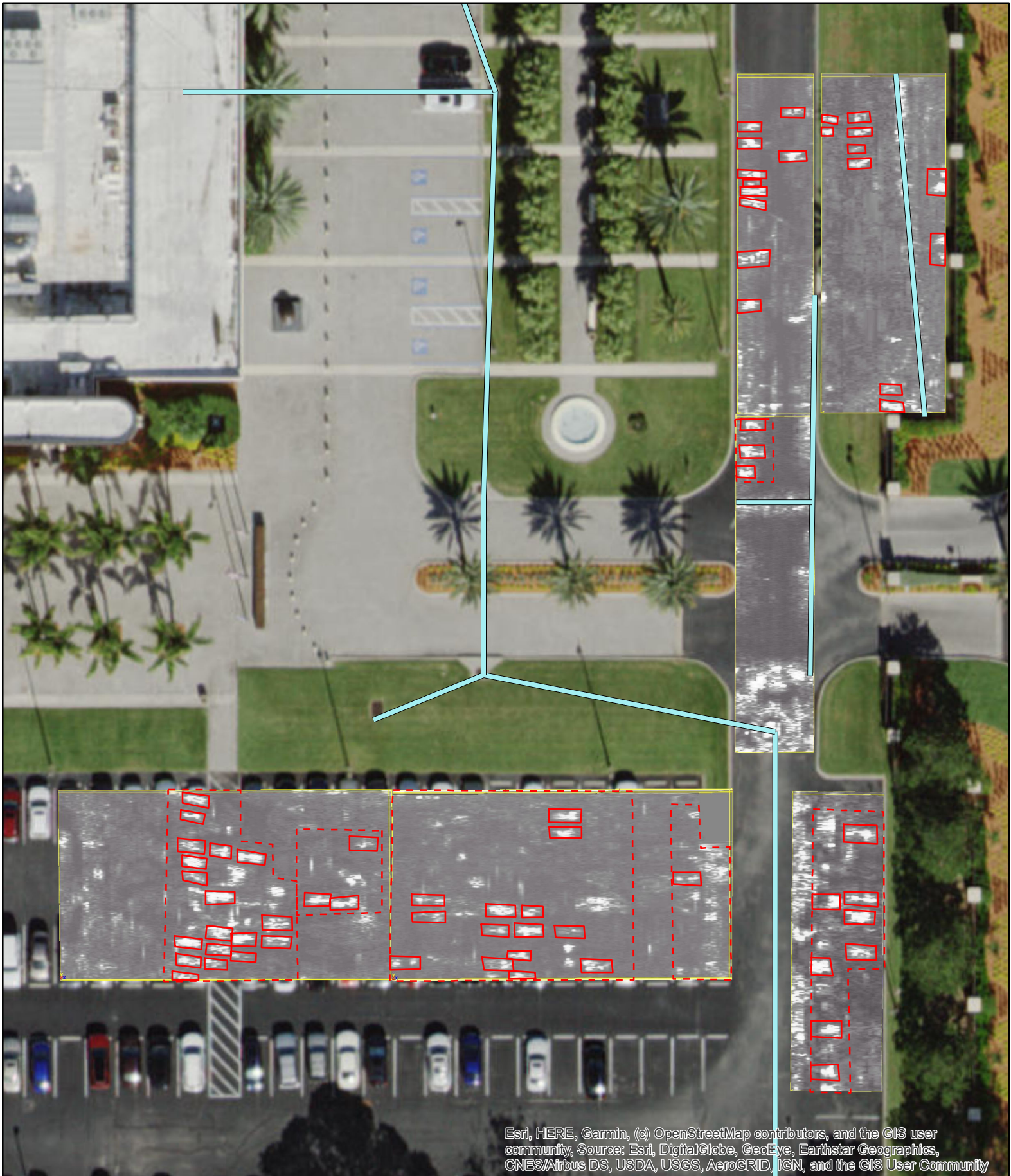

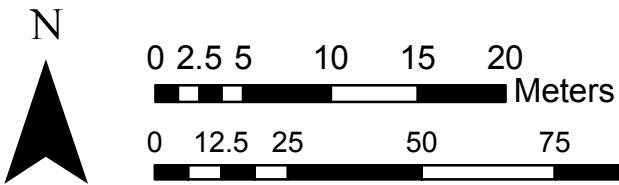
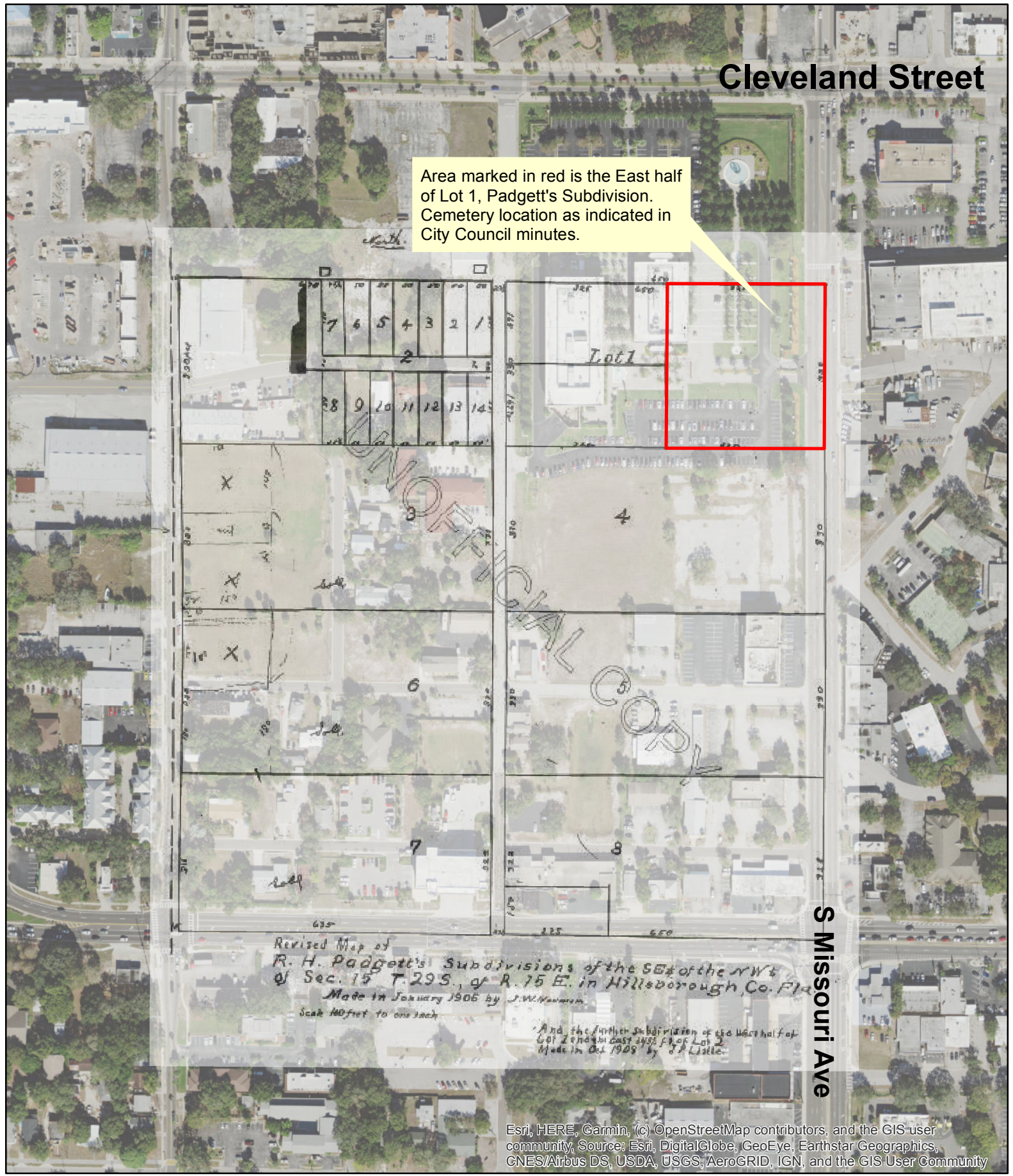


Figure 3: GPR results for grids 6-11. Areas marked in solid red are possible burials. Areas marked with a dashed red line are general areas of buried objects that could contain burials. Blue lines are buried utilities or trenches.

Missouri Ave in Clearwater, Florida. Local informants reported that a historic cemetery may be located on the property. As reported by the informants, the cemetery was thought to be located in the southern portion, currently an unused and open lot vacant of any buildings. The locations of the survey areas are shown in Figure 1. No gravestones or other visible markers are present within the surveyed area.

The purpose of the investigation was to use geophysical methods to determine the potential for unmarked graves. Archaeologists performed the survey over three days in January 2020 (January 21-23, 2020).

Description of Geophysical Method:

FPAN staff conducted a ground penetrating radar (GPR) survey of selected areas within the designated project area using a SIR-3000 GPR manufactured by GSSI, Inc. and outfitted with a 400-MHz antenna. Five grids were completed in total, with Grids 1-4 located in the open, vacant lot area of the property. Grid 5 was located more to the east, just south of the staff parking area (See Figure 1 for Grid locations). The results of grids 1-5 are reported here.

GPR survey grids 1-4 are similar in size (30m x 30m); grid 5 varied in size and shape but all data were collected in the same manner: uni-directional north-south transects spaced at .25 meters (approximately 10 inches) east-west along a baseline, with 512 samples per scan, and a time window of 50ns. Given the capabilities and limitations of the SIR 3000 unit, we designed the survey to optimize our ability to detect potential sub-surface historic cemetery features and burials. With Christian burials, graves are often laid out in an east-west orientation typically two to six feet beneath the surface. By using north-south survey transects we hoped to cross any potential burials at a perpendicular angle across their short axis, allowing for the clearest possible reflections. The relatively small transverse interval, .25 meters between each survey transect, was also necessary due to the potential for child or infant burials within the cemetery. Survey transect intervals should generally be designed to be smaller than the long axis of the potential objects being studied.

The SIR 3000 data were post-processed by FPAN using GSSI's Radan 7 software package. Depth slice images were created for every 10 cm in increasing depth below the ground surface, intermediate slices were created as needed or when distinct anomalies were observed between the 10 cm intervals.

Survey Results:

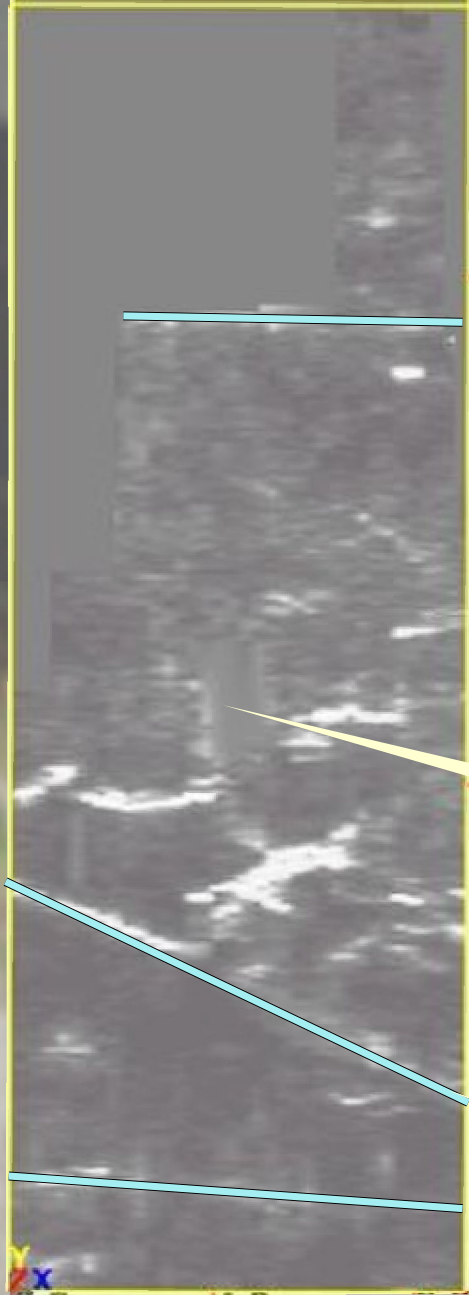
Figure 2: GPR results for grids 1-4 at 110 cm below the surface.

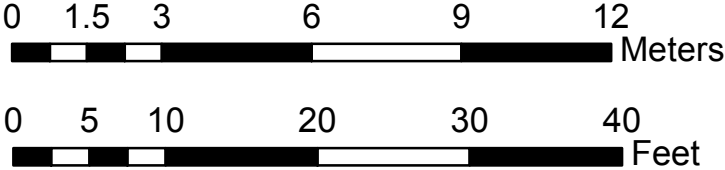
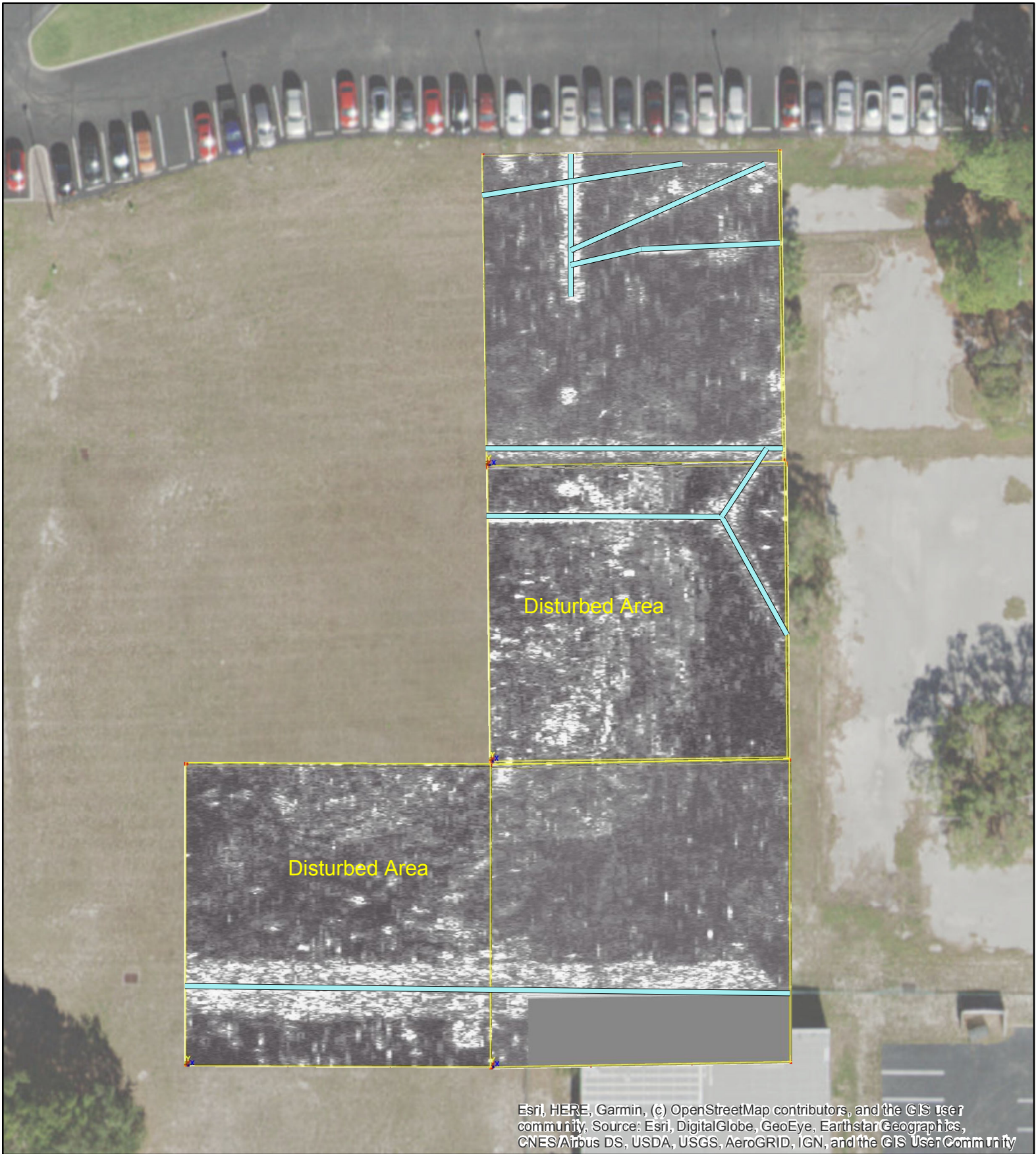


Figure 3: GPR grid 5 results at 80 cm below the surface. Utilities are marked in blue, white objects are probable roots.

Analysis of the processed GPR data does not indicate an overall presence of grave-like anomalies in the areas surveyed. See Figures 2 and 3 for GPR results of Grids 1-4 at 110cmbs (centimeters below surface)

and of Grid 5 at 80cmbs. The soil within Grids 1-4 appears to be highly disturbed with multiple reflections picked up by the GPR. These reflections appear to be that of utility lines, such as large storm drainages, and their associated construction trenches, crossing through much of vacant lot. Other reflections are likely to be debris, possibly the results of building demolition and site work. The debris appears to be chunks of rubble or concrete some of which are visible on the surface throughout the area surveyed. The buried objects that are visible throughout much of the collected data resemble this type of debris and are generally the same size as to what is visible on the surface (between 1 to 3 feet in varying shapes). These objects do not fit a pattern expected in a cemetery setting. In Figure 4, utility lines are identified in blue; areas of buried debris are also labeled in yellow.

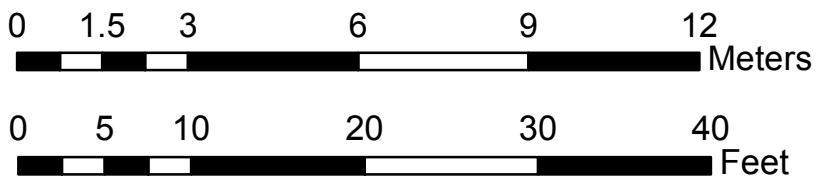
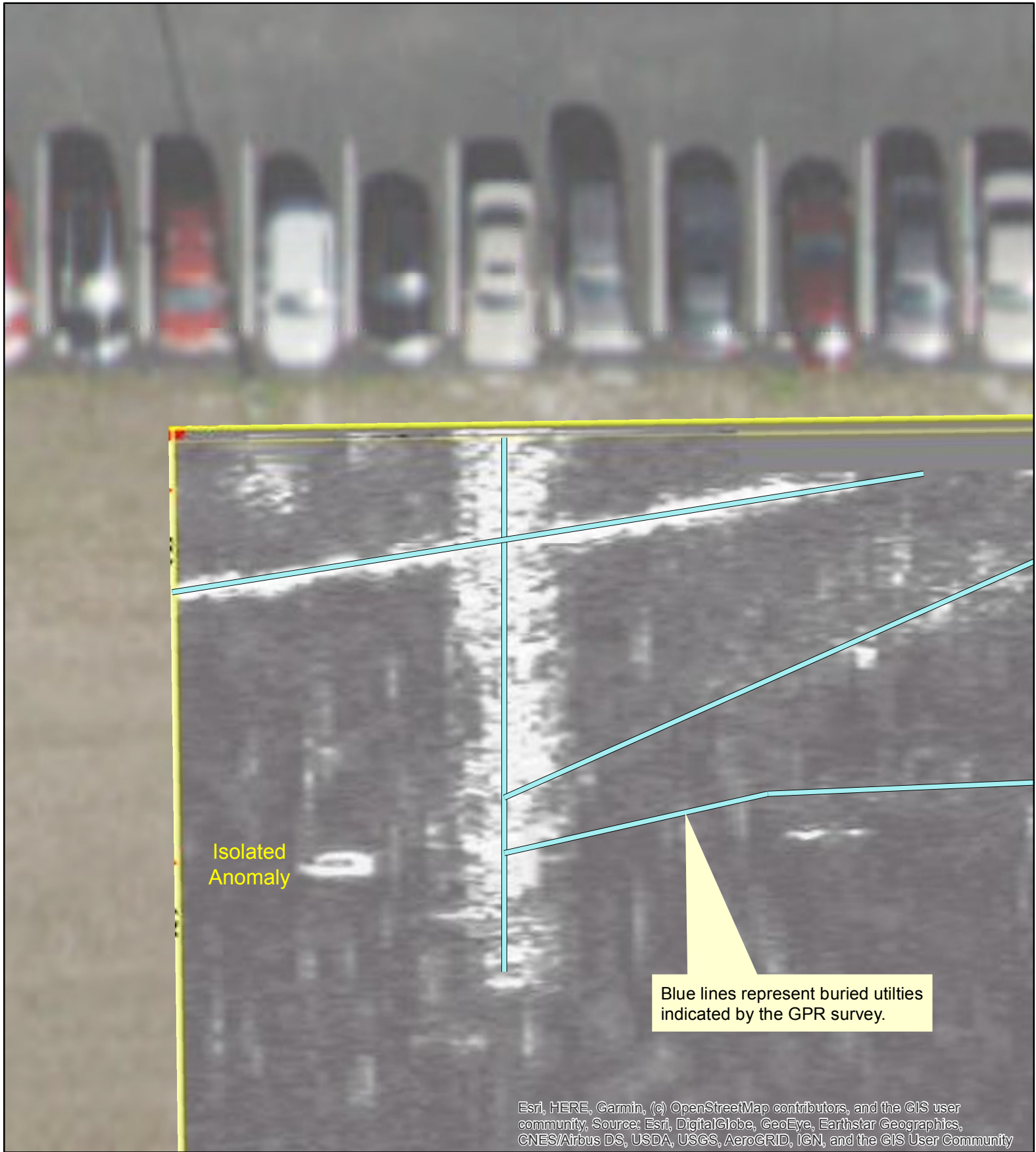


Figure 5: Isolated anomaly at around 150 cm below surface with surrounding utilities marked in blue.

During analysis of the GPR data, archaeologists identified an isolated anomaly that caught our attention and appears different from the other reflections. It is located in Grid 1 and can be seen in Figure 5. This buried object in particular is located at a depth common with historic burials, is vaguely rectangular in shape, and is larger than the other debris discussed above. This buried anomaly is approximately 5 to 6 feet along its long axis. However, there are no other similar anomalies nearby and its proximity to a buried utility makes it more likely that this reflection is related to the buried utilities or other more modern disturbances. Out of an abundance of caution however, we recommend that if any ground disturbances are planned in the future that this one area is investigated more fully.

Further Discovery:

Press coverage of the GPR survey led to a descendant of a previous owner of the property in question to come forward with information and direct memory of the cemetery and its location. Also, reanalysis of historic documents provided by local historian Alison Dolan led to further discovery of more information related to the cemetery's location.

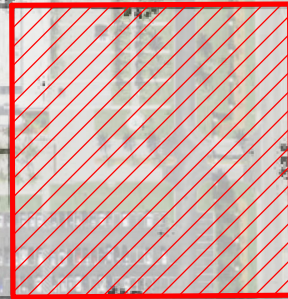
Figure 6: City of Clearwater meeting minutes from November 15, 1954 indicating the location of an African American cemetery in R. H. Padgett's Subdivision, east 325 ft of Lot 1, less the east 30 ft.

Figure 6 is a portion of City of Clearwater Commission meeting minutes from November 15, 1954. The City of Clearwater at the time was making improvements to Missouri Ave and decided to charge adjacent property owners for cost. Amongst those property owners was listed, "R. H. Padgett's Subdivision -E. 325 ft. of Lot 1 less E. 30 ft – St. Matthews Baptist Church Negro Cemetery." According to the document, the church was expected to pay \$1,251.07 for pavement and \$619.70 for sewers. The document went on to say that property owners had 30 days to pay or, "the City Treasurer is hereby directed to issue and sell certificates of indebtedness under Section 124 of the City Charter, which certificates shall bear interest at the rate of 8% per annum against the foregoing properties..." [City Commission Meeting Minutes, Nov 15, 1954]. Figure 7 shows the location of R.H. Padgett's subdivision, E 325ft of Lot 1 overlaid onto a modern aerial photograph.

This is the first known official document to provide location of the cemetery and its boundaries. Further GPR survey will focus in this area to determine the potential for historic burials.

Figure 4: GPR results at 110 cm below surface with utility lines marked in blue.
